

Anderson opens with Celebration of photography

Folkboat Atlantic locates across street

Anderson, a new gallery of fine art photography and Folkboat Atlantic, open their doors in Lunenburg on Saturday from 2 to 6 p.m.

Anderson, which is a private initiative with the objective to celebrate the photographic image and the art of photography in all forms and appearances, will open at 160 Montague St.

The building was originally constructed for Lewis Anderson in 1873, who started his own business trading

with West India. Last year Clearwater sold the building, in the centre of Lunenburg, as part of its strategy to move its operations out of town.

Anderson offers books and cards on the ground floor of the building and there will be a gallery of fine art photography on the second floor. The gallery will continually display work by its members and will showcase individual members and guest exhibi-

tors throughout the year.

Folkboat Atlantic, which opens its showroom on Bluenose Drive, opposite 160, brings the famous Folkboat from Kerteminde, Denmark to North America to be admired yearround. It is the initiative of Toon Nagetegaal, who sails his own Folkboat in the Mahone Bay area and beyond.

Anderson will be open daily from 10:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Its first exhibition is Celebration, featuring the work of John Berridge,

Christopher Porter and Mariette Roodenburg.

Berridge's work is informal portraits and still-life photography, all shot in colour. Many of his photos were made while travelling and reflect his love for India and South Asia.

Porter works in both colour and black and white.

Roodenburg's landscapes are either traditional black and white photographs hand printed on fiber, or colour photographs which are digitally scanned and printed.
